



The note A (la) is related to the parent key of C, and is heard as T9 on G7 The note E (mi) is heard as T13 on G7(9,13)


Please note that the singing or playing of C (do) represents V7 to I resolution.



The note Ab (le) is heard as Tb9 on G7(b9)



The note Eb(me) is heard as Tb13 or Tb5 on G7(9,b13)



The note Db(ra) or C#(di) is heard as Tb5 or T#11 on G7(b5) or G7(#11)

The note Bb(te) is heard as T#9 on G7(#9). It usually found on an altered dominant scale





The notes A(la), E(mi) and Db/C#(ra/di) are heard as T9, Tb5/#11 and T13 on G7(9, #11, 13)





The notes Ab(le), Eb(me) and Db/C#(ra/di) are heard as Tb9,Tb5/#11 and Tb13 on G7(b9,#11,b13)



All these tensions can be heard as altered dominant: b9,#9,#11 and b13

Remember that the singing or playing of C (do) represents V7 to I resolution.
